Teaching Sunday school for 30 years, she relinquished her role in 2019. "There comes a time when we need a change," she said. "I was tired, but I was grateful for all the volunteers, especially Sandee Hughes who was an integral part of it." Adding that the kids were fun, Barb believed they needed to feel like part of the church community. "I wanted families to know their kids were important. Sunday school wasn't just a place to keep them upstairs, to keep them quiet and engaged....it was about *their* church life." And, she quipped, "It kept me out of trouble, too." A former Vestry member who fulfilled two terms, Barb likes interaction with parishioners but prefers being a "worker bee" instead of the responsibility of a leadership role. Because of Chris Henry, she became involved in Hospitality....and still is an important part of this ministry under chairperson Sandee Hughes.

"I do whatever is needed whenever it's needed," she offered. For many years, she headed the former annual Christmas Tea fundraiser. Since gardening is a personal interest, Barb works tirelessly on the gardens at St. George's. "It wasn't officially a ministry until three years ago when Meg Hughes took it on. There's growth in the gardens, and we have a good group working together. We take on a space that needs attention." Barb also likes crafting, walking her dog (Wilson), photography, and reading. As if she isn't busy enough, Barb has worked part-time for over a dozen years as head cashier in the book store at SUNY Schenectady. Married since 1977 to Jeff, our current Treasurer at St. George's, they have two grown children: Erin, who lives in Croton-on-the-Hudson with her husband Alex, and Sam, who is temporarily living back home with them in Scotia. Their 2nd home on Nantucket is a rental where they vacation with family and friends several times a year. Barb is not a beach person "...but everyone else is, and we have fun playing games at night." The Wengrovius' also have a timeshare in Hawaii where they indulge in a yearly get-away. What does she like best about St. George's? ALL SAINTS /ALL SOULS



All Saints' Day had a different look this year as our worship was a service of morning prayer, complete with academic hoods worn by Officiant David Kennison and Christopher Henry and the choir. We sang our favorite hymns of the day, "I Sing a Song of the Saints of God" and "For All the Saints," which leave the best echoes in our heads. The anthem was "The Souls of the Righteous" by Geraint Lewis, with lovely, haunting harmonies. Dr. Brian Taylor gave the homily, exploring how saints are like us.

For the Requiem Mass of All Souls' Day St. George's welcomed The Rev. Fr. Dale Van Wormer, Jr. of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Unadilla and St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Sydney. This was a chanted Requiem, ancient and beautiful, creating a solemn tone for the Necrology, when congregants lit candles as names of the dead were spoken. Fr. Van Wormer began his sermon by saying that saints in the presence of God continue to pray for us, therefore All Souls' Day is for all of us. We pray for the dead because we hold them in our love, and so they can grow in love and service to God; this is because the final judgement has not yet come. We can be confident that our Lord hears our prayers.

To emphasize the importance of praying for the dead the congregation ended the service by processing into the graveyard, where Fr. Van Wormer spoke the Absolution of the Dead, we recited prayers, he censed and sprinkled the plots with holy water, and ended with these familiar words:

May these souls, and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in Peace. Amen.

As we stood together I thought especially of the twin babies buried there. It felt right to bring Peace and Remembrance to the churchyard. Afterward we enjoyed refreshments and fellowship in St. George's House and had an opportunity to meet Fr. Van Wormer.

The Diocese of Albany's (DoA) 153rd convention was again a virtual affair. If some of us complained a bit too vigorously in the past about having to go to convention, with all its happy-clappy Camp-of-the-Woods shtick, those prayers were answered with this second consecutive remote gathering. No overnight stays in a chilly cabin with a lumpy mattress, no camp food and no endless programmed activities. Nope, just the facts ma'am. Do the business and it's over.



Your appointed delegates (David Kennison, Anne Kennison, Bob Paska) assembled on October 23 at 8AM in the parish office and settled in for a long day of Zoom. Notwithstanding balky video, on-line voting, technical glitches and the rest - the diocese's 2021 business got done. There were 55 parishes (out of 112 total in the diocese) and 108 clergy members participating.

Address from the Standing Committee Normally, this would be an address from the bishop on the state of the diocese. Since we currently do not have a seated bishop following Bp. Love Love's February 2021 resignation, this address was given by Fr. Scott Garno, President of the Standing Committee. Fr. Garno praised the strength and expanse of the DoA and praised newly ordained clergy and those who seek to enter the diocese. He said the DoA has a sizeable amount of surplus cash and will pay their full assessment to the Episcopal Church (TEC), thereby restoring eligibility for TEC grants to parishes. The diocesan financial health was strongly supported by the federal government's pandemic stimulus of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP).

The convention agenda contained 7 submitted resolutions for consideration. Two of those proposed modifying the current diocesan canons to remove the prohibition that defines marriage as only between 1 man and 1 woman. Those canons also prohibit clergy from participating in same-sex marriages and prohibit use of church buildings for same. This is the issue over which Bp. Love resigned. The DoA is the only diocese in the Episcopal Church that prohibits same-sex marriage, making them in violation of Resolution B012 of the 2016 General Convention. These DoA canons are considered unenforceable since they directly conflict with TEC canons, but they are retained by the DoA to make a position statement. And so, these convention resolutions would have been highly contentious, likely with much spirited debate. Early on, a clergy member made a procedural motion to block any resolution that proposed changing church canons during a virtual meeting, requiring such changes to be done only at an in-person meeting. The presenting reason was that virtual meetings stifled debate, but this was a sly way of blocking these resolutions from even being discussed. This motion passed by a significant margin, thereby delaying consideration of these motions to a 2022 in-person convention.

Voting and Convention Resolutions Various offices were voted to fill from nominations, seldom contested. Those offices are: (1) The Great Cathedral Chapter, (2) Convention Representative to Diocesan Council, (3) Trustees of the Diocese, (4) The Disciplinary Board, (5) The Standing Committee.

Resolutions were mostly perfunctory, as follows:

Increase the recommended clergy stipend schedule by 5.0%. PASSED A schedule of normative 2022 salaries for parishes of different sizes was provided.

Use the Reduced Standard Assessment Formula for 2022 parish assessments. PASSED By this formula, St. George's 2022 assessment is \$40,871, up from \$11,383 in 2021.

Approve the proposed 2021 Diocese of Albany Operations Budget. The 2022 budget is \$1,477,425, down from \$1,590,544 in 2021. PASSED 81% of this (\$1,195,992) comes from parish assessments.

Courtesy resolutions to thank diocesan and convention staff and Christ the King staff. PASSED

Other gleanings of note:

The 2021 operating budget for Christ the King Spiritual Life Center is \$1,135,473 (a deficit of \$128K).

The 2021 Diocesan Payments & Commitments (support to The Episcopal Church) is \$143,703 (9.5% of income). The expected support level is 15%, paid by more than 90% of dioceses.

And so ended the 153rd diocesan convention. Next year, we hope for a return to an in-person convention.



THANKSGIVING CHORAL EVENSONG

Now Thank We All Our God” joyfully began and ended beautiful Choral Evensong on November 14, as a prelude by J.S. Bach and again as the familiar hymn. Thanksgiving was the theme as Georgians gave thanks for God’s protection through another difficult pandemic year. Officiant David Kennison and Thurifer Christopher Henry, robed and hooded, escorted the St. Cecelia Choir into the sanctuary to the hymn, “Come, Ye Thankful People, Come.”

Dr. Brian Taylor chose Richard Ayleward’s classic responses as the choral framework for the service. The choir also sang Everett Titcomb’s *Magnificat* and *Nunc Dimittis*, the familiar words and interweaving voices alternating with scripture lessons from Joel and Thessalonians read by Meredith Ewbank.

Thomas Schofield, Director of Food Pantry, Schenectady Inner City Ministries, gave the address. He spoke about the support the food pantry receives, about their efforts to be more accessible, how they deliver throughout Schenectady County and work with school districts, and his hope that someday in the future Schenectady will thrive. His presence was a reminder that many in our community are in great need. 50% of the offering from Evensong was given to the SICM Food Pantry to aid with their work.

The anthem, “Thou Visitest the Earth” by Maurice Green, began with a solo by John Ewbank. It put to music one glorious statement from the Psalms: *Thou visitest the earth, and blessest it; thou makest it very plenteous. Thou crownest the year with thy goodness; and thy clouds drop fatness.*

As the months have progressed in 2021, Georgians have faithfully and generously supported SICM food pantry “little red wagon” collections. To date, 1,427 pounds of food and personal care items have been turned over to the SICM food pantry, 839 Albany Street Schenectady. During

50% of the collection gathered at the Evensong service was designated for the SICM food pantry, it yielded a \$274 donation.

Unfortunately, not much has been accomplished in whittling down the list of outstanding maintenance items since the last Georgian Report, as my focus has been on the issues of the Rector and the former Sextons (not to mention that we are currently out of funds to address routine maintenance needs). A major problem was dramatically brought to our attention when water infiltrated an electrical conduit, causing a short which blew out a transformer, leaving the sanctuary in the dark. Luckily, the necessary repairs/replacements were effected quickly, and the costs were covered by our insurance.

- TREASURER'S REPORT -

This December Georgian Journal is an excellent time to look back on our Church's finances in 2021 and to also look forward to 2022. First, let's focus on 2021.

We have a lot to be thankful for in this year. Our pledge giving will surpass our budget by a significant amount!! Most importantly, we will balance out the year in a good financial condition. This is TOTALLY due to your continued generosity.



However, we faced some very significant unexpected expenses in 2021. We suffered the loss of the boiler to the Great Hall that resulted in having to take \$43,000 from our endowment principal to replace this equipment. This is the first time in many years that we have taken principle from our endowment. We also suffered large bills to repair plumbing problems in the Great Hall. Most recently, we experienced a significant electrical issue in our Church. Luckily, these losses were covered by our insurance policy with Church Mutual. The result was a huge improvement to the electrical infrastructure to our Church with minimal cost to our budget. I'd like to be optimistic to say that the worst of these issues are behind us. HOWEVER, we have an aging group of buildings that will continue to present us with problems going forward.

Looking forward to 2022, we are diligently preparing a budget for the coming year. This has been made a bit more difficult by the resignation of Father Matt. I will make a personal appeal to all parishioners to continue giving. Our numbers are getting smaller, thus, we need to rely on everyone to pledge as much as you are able. I am confident that we will thrive through this next phase of our Church's ministry. My plea to everyone is to keep St. George's in your prayers. Reach out to all members to give comfort in our time of transition. Stay loyal. Our Church has survived for hundreds of years. NOW is as important as ever to show our LOVE and DEVOTION to each other and our Church.

Finally, I would like to give thanks to the unseen heroes of the financial side of St. George's Church. These include Bob McCloskey who tirelessly works to our benefit and to Jon Pearson who continues to support our treasury. Of course I always welcome comments and suggestions.

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
